




OPENING ACCLAMATION

A READING FROM THE PROPHET ISAIAH

I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels.

For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

For Zion's sake I will not keep silent, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest, until her vindication shines out like the dawn, and her salvation like a burning torch.

The nations shall see your vindication, and all the kings your glory; and you shall be called by a new name

that the mouth of the Lord will give. You shall be a crown of beauty in the hand of the Lord,

and a royal diadem in the hand of your God.




Worship God, O Je-/rusalem; * praise your Sovereign, O / Zion;

For the Holy One has strengthened the bars of your / gates * and has blessed your children with-/in you.

In this passage from Isaiah [61:10—62:3], the prophet, who ministered in the eighth century BC, shares a vision of the coming Messianic reign.

We sing the psalm to simplified Anglican chant. The / marks in the verses correspond to the bar lines in the music. You are welcome to sing in unison or harmony.



Worship God, O / Jerusalem; * praise your Sovereign, O / Zion.

Peace has been established on your / borders; * you are satisfied with the finest / wheat.

You send out your command to the / earth, * and your word runs very / swiftly.

You give snow like / wool * and scatter hoarfrost like / ashes.

You scatter your hail like / bread crumbs; * who can stand against your / cold?

You send forth your word and / melt them; * you blow with your wind and the waters / flow.

You declare your word to / Jacob, * your statutes and your judgments to / Israel.

You have not done so to any other / nation; * to them you have not revealed your judgments. Alle-/luia!

A Reading from the Letter of Paul to the Galatians

Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian.

But when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, in order to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children.

In this passage the letter to the Christians in Galatia (modern Turkey) [3:23-25; 4:4-7], the author teaches about the incarnation.


And because you are children, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" So you are no longer a slave but a child, and if a child then also an heir, through God.

THE GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

THE SERMON The Reverend Nancy Ross

A period of silent reflection follows.

THE NICENE CREED

Please stand in body or spirit.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified,

The sermon helps us to reflect on the Scriptures we have heard and to connect them to the Good News present in our lives now.

The Nicene Creed comes to us from the Councils of Nicea (325) and Constantinople (381, where they edited it). It is, therefore, an ancient statement of faith that we hold in common with many Christian denominations. As a statement of belief, that is, of communal trust (not an intellectual assertion of how these things could be), we recite it collectively as a prayer, ending with "Amen."

Glory to you, God, for Mary's loving care. Lead us to tend to one another in time of need. Share the comfort of your presence with all people who are lonely or separated from loved ones due to estrangement, incarceration, or circumstance, and your healing grace to those facing illness or need, especially those we name ... Hear us, O God.

Your mercy is great.

preferring instead echo chambers that drown out the Good News. Too often, we have valued violence instead of your peace.

Grant us the grace to begin again.

Free us from all that keeps us bound, and forgive our sin, through Jesus Christ, who gives himself for us. Amen.

Hear the good news and rejoice!

You are God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, forgiven in Christ, and freed to respond in joy. **Amen.**

We confess the ways in which we have fallen short of God's love, after which a priest pronounces absolution, God's forgiveness, over the people.

And also with you.




It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God, through our Savior Jesus Christ.

The Sanctus, "Holy,"is the song of the angels (Isaiah 6 and Rev. 4). It has been an acclamation of the congregation since around the 4th century. This setting is by Franz Schubert.



Holy One, the beginning and the end, the giver of life:

Blessed are you for the birth of creation.

Blessed are you in the darkness and in the light.

Blessed are you for your promise to your people.

Blessed are you in the prophets' hopes and dreams.

Blessed are you for Mary's openness to your will.

Blessed are you for your Son Jesus, the Word made flesh.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

With this bread and cup we remember your Word dwelling among us, full of grace and truth. We remember our new birth in his death and resurrection. We look with hope for his coming.

Come, Lord Jesus.



All praise and glory are yours, Holy One of Israel, Word of God incarnate, Power of the Most High, one God, now and forever.




May God, who sent angels to proclaim the glad news of the Savior's birth, fill you with joy, and make you heralds of the Gospel. **Amen**.
